Crew Biographies

Lorraine Brooks (Director) appeared at Vagabond Players in 2019 as Bailiff in *12 Angry Jurors*. She has since been concentrating on directing. Recent shows include *Fires in the Mirror*; *Miss Evers' Boys* (WATCH nomination for Best Ensemble Cast); *Old Settler* (WATCH nomination for Best Hair and Makeup Design); *Consecrated Ground*; and her own play *Out of the Blue*, a compilation of interviews with 9/11 first responders. Lorraine is also a formally trained artist, specializing in stipple. Her works are in collections in the US, UK, Caribbean, and Netherlands.

Jana King (Stage Manager) retired from over 40 years with the DC and PG County Public Schools as a Visual Arts and Special Education teacher. Director's Note

PIPELINE is one of those plays which transcends time and place, and that statement is, in itself, a commentary on the state of public education in US cities. The title refers to the "*school-to-prison pipeline*" which the American Civil Liberties Union calls "the policies and practices that push our nation's students, especially our most at-risk children, out of classrooms and into the juvenile and criminal justice systems. This pipeline reflects the prioritization of incarceration over education." These policies often negatively affect Black youth disproportionately.

Dominique Morisseau's insightful and tense drama deals with the emotions and fears of one mother whose son's anger has caused him to react with violence towards a teacher at his boarding school. The story centers around Omari Joseph, who has been suspended because of an altercation with a teacher. His mother, Nya, a teacher at an inner city high school, sees this incident as the possible beginning of Omari's descent down the pipeline. She has seen it many times in her own school, and she fears she cannot stop her son's trajectory. We see the struggles of a single mother, a son whose rage is overwhelming him and threatening his future, an absent father whose financial support does not take the place of his physical presence, and a school system that often does not meet the needs of students and teachers alike.

I chose this play to direct because of its relevance in today's world, and to Baltimore in particular. Young Black men are often misunderstood and judged, and they remain vulnerable in ways that our society has yet to deal with adequately or honestly. My hope is that it will help to foster a dialog between parents and children and raise awareness of some of the challenges our public school systems face.
